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Chair's Report



What a difficult year.

It's been hard in so many ways, not least because of Covid, and yet good has come from it. As Jesus reminds us in Luke 13.1-9, like the fig tree we can discern if we are going in the direction God wants us to by the fruit which is yielded. There is plenty of fruit in this Benefice.

Before the end of May we will have had three appointments in the Benefice; Barry our new Reader emeritus, Tony our soon to be Assistant Minister and Steph our latest Authorised Lay Minister. These very able volunteers sit alongside a growing team including three other ALM's, and two people actively discerning Ordained Ministry, and who are well on the way to realising that calling. This is good fruit.

We have two thriving Toddler groups, a brand-new Youth group, now into double figures, an emerging Sunday school and alongside our partners at Changing Places are organising a huge Leavers assembly involving all our five Church schools. This sits alongside our weekly assemblies at three of our Church schools and the many ways in which we support them all, and the community schools too.

We have a new Worship pattern to engage with, which includes the reopening of Holy Trinity and a new monthly service there. And we are well into plans for a new monthly service in the form of a café Church based at St Peters.

As I say, this is Good Fruit.

Our biggest challenge, which will direct our future, is that of finance. We don't come close to paying Parish share. With the reshaping of the Mission community and the pressures to reduce Clergy across the Church of England, we have to ask ourselves is our future stable without solid Stewardship supporting us?

There is work to be done here, yet there is good fruit to uplift us and to encourage us onwards. I have no doubt, with some innovation and lots of prayers we will meet these challenges and continue to grow.

PCC Secretary's Report

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our Rector Father Stephen Nolan, the Church Wardens, Deputy Wardens, Treasurer and members of the PCC for their support throughout another challenging year. The PCC met at both 'live meetings' in church and 'virtual meetings' on Zoom, on 9 occasions, during the period January to December 2021.

JANUARY

The year started with a virtual Emergency Covid Meeting on 8th January, when following discussion, **a vote was taken in favour of the closure of St John's Church from 5th January 2021 until 31st January 2021. The reason for the dispensation of reading of Morning and Evening Prayer and the celebration of Holy Communion, both required by Canon Law, was in light of the Government's regulations and guidance on preventing the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic, that it was not safe to open the church for public worship on those occasions.**

A further virtual meeting was held on 28th January when the decision was reviewed and **we agreed to open St John's Church on Sunday 7th February 2021**.

Father Stephen explained that David Grae had been appointed to set up the Deanery Church Plant in Bolton but no budget had been allocated to do the job. We agreed to donate £100 to the Deanery Mission Church Plant in Bolton. This was money we had allocated from our Mission Action Plan Budget for the Portrait Competition that had not gone ahead due to Covid.

FINANCE

Father Stephen thanked our Treasurer, Sandra Croston, for producing the Finance Report for 2020. He reminded members of our 'in year' deficit and need to increase our giving. He didn't want to get into a position where we may need to close the church. He said he would write to everyone on the Electoral Roll, requesting that they pay their 'planned giving' to church by Standing Order and give consideration to reviewing their giving or make a 'One Off' donation to church.

FEBRUARY

At the February virtual meeting, following further discussion, it was confirmed that St John's Church would carry on as normal and remain open.

FINANCE

Father Stephen confirmed that he had sent a 'Begging Letter' to everyone on the electoral roll; in addition letters had also been placed on pew seats in church, requesting one-off donations and for church members to increase their planned giving.

SET OF NEW CHURCH BELL ROPES



The secretary reported that the set of new bell ropes donated by Mrs Cynthia Gethin, in memory of her husband Victor Gethin, a lifelong member of St John's Church, Church Warden for over 20 years, and former chair of Governors at St John's School, had been received. Jim Andrews from the Lancashire Association of Bell Ringers would store them until Covid restrictions were lifted and would then arrange for them to be fitted.

Father Stephen updated on the current position regarding the bell tower ladder, which the mobile communications engineer, had stated was too near the wall and was unsafe. The first audit had stated it

was unsafe, a second audit had been carried out and stated it was safe but would benefit from grips and clips.

ALM TRAINING IN CHILDRENS MINISTRY

Steph Buckley reported she had now completed 4 training sessions and had led worship at the beginning of a session.

MARCH

In March, we again carried out a further review of church use during Covid at our virtual meeting, when Father Stephen told members he was still awaiting advice from the Diocese on the next steps. He informed members that the churches of St Stephen's, Kearsley Moor and St Saviours, Stoneclough were to re-open for worship on Sunday 28th March 2021.

FINANCE

The 2020 Audited Parish Accounts, which had been circulated prior to the meeting, were shared on screen and approved unanimously for submission to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Begging Letter Analysis:- Father Stephen gave an interim report that so far £1,500 had been received in donations and a number of church members had increased their Planned Giving Standing Orders.

We arranged our Annual Parochial Church Meeting for Thursday 20th May 2021 in church at 7.00pm.

APRIL

At the review of church use during Covid at our April virtual meeting, members who had been attending church during the current Covid situation were asked whether they felt safe with the social distancing measures and systems that were in place. The consensus was that members felt content with the measures that were in place.

Bell Tower Ladder to Antenna Risk Assessment – ongoing

Members were informed that once Covid restrictions were lifted in June, a faculty would be submitted to re-position the ladder. Father Stephen reported that following an inspection by the Diocesan architect, a recommendation to re-position the ladder had been made. However, the Diocesan Bell Tower Inspector had said the position would restrict swinging of the bell and a different position was recommended.

Quinquennial

Members were informed that the Lightning Detector had been tested. Three Electrical quotations had been obtained and members had agreed unanimously that the Electrical Inspection be carried out at a cost of £1,320.

MARRIAGE DOCUMENTS

Members were informed that there was no longer a requirement for marriage certificates to be issued and that they would be replaced with a marriage document and our current registration books would be signed off. No weddings had taken place this year but we had weddings booked for next year.

CONFIRMATION AT ST JOHN'S CHURCH

It was announced that Confirmation would take place at St John's Church on Sunday 27th June 2021 at 3.00pm by Bishop Mark Ashcroft. There were to be 4 virtual Confirmation Classes and in response to a letter, which had been sent to all 5 church schools in our Benefice plus Prestolee Community School, we already had 16 candidates for confirmation.

BIBLES FOR TODDLER GROUP LEAVERS

In response to a request from Steph Buckley, members agreed to buy 6 Children's Bibles, to be presented to those toddlers who had attended the group since it relocated to church and were leaving to go to school in September 2021.

THIS IS YOUR MOVE BOOKS FOR YEAR 6 SCHOOL LEAVERS

Members agreed to the purchase of 'This is Your Move Books' for the Year 6 school leavers at our three church schools, All Saints CE Primary, St John's CE Primary and St Peter's CE Primary.

MAY

On 9th May 2021 our Team Vicar, Kim Lafferty, took her last service at St John's Church, before moving to take up the position of Rector at the Scottish Episcopal Church, East Perthshire in the Diocese of St Andrews.



The Chair, Father Stephen, chaired the Annual Parish Church Meeting, Annual Parochial Church Meeting and the First Meeting of the newly elected PCC on Thursday 20th May 2021. Dr Steven Mann and Graham Martin were nominated Church Wardens. The Parish Accounts for 2020 were approved and thanks expressed to our Treasurer Sandra Croston.

The Electoral Roll Officer, Kim McIntyre, reported that the 2020 Electoral Roll closed at 103.

At the First Meeting of the newly elected Parochial Church Council, the following officers were elected – Chair Revd Stephen Nolan, Lay Vice Chair Stephanie Buckley, Secretary Dorothy McGlynn, Treasurer Sandra Croston and Electoral Roll Officer Kim McIntyre. The Standing Committee, with powers to make emergency decisions, comprised of the Chair, Treasurer, the two Church Wardens and the Secretary.

JUNE

SOCIALLY DISTANCED CONFIRMATION SERVICE





On Sunday 27th June we held our 'Socially Distanced' Confirmation Service, at which the Bishop of Bolton Mark Ashcroft presided. **We had 38 candidates, a recent record number and had to open our gallery to accommodate the congregation and their God Parents.**

JULY

Father Stephen informed the virtual meeting that the Church of England had done a preamble prior to the lifting of Covid Restrictions on Monday 19th July 2021 but had basically left the decisions to the clergy and PCC's.

He had prepared a plan, which he proposed to implement from 25th July 2021 and keep in place until the end of September 2021. He wanted to return to normal as much as possible from 25th July 2021. **It was agreed unanimously that from Sunday 25th July 2021:-**

1) Bring back singing. 2) Resume serving tea and coffee. 3) Remove tape from pews – enabling people to sit where they want. 4) Begin receiving bread from the front of the church. 5) NO WINE YET (unless told otherwise) 6) Masks Optional. 7) Still have 2 exits open. 8) No Track and Trace. 9) Collection Plate passed round during Gospel Hymn. 10) Choir in full procession.

MEMORIAL PLOTS

Prior to the meeting a document had been circulated, identifying a 'new area' of the New Church Yard which would accommodate 8 additional Full Burial Plots and 20 Ashes Burial Plots. Father Stephen said that as the burials took place in the 'new area' he would make sure relatives of the deceased would be given a set of Churchyard Regulations, outlining what is allowed to be placed on graves in the churchyard. Members unanimously agreed to the additional 8 Full Burial Plots and 20 Ashes Burial Plots.

Obituaries Memorial on Memorial Garden plot on which names could be carved.

A question was raised regarding the erection of an 'Obituaries Memorial' on the 'Memorial Garden' on which names could be carved. A decision was made to re-visit this request in 2022.

FINANCE

It was agreed the Mission Action Fund was to be saved and used to fund the 'new' Youth Group.

Members agreed to the purchase of 15 Bibles, which would be kept in church, for the use of the new Youth Group in response to a request by Steph Buckley.

ALM MINISTRY ROLE DESCRIPTION

The ALM – Ministry Role Description for Steph Buckley was approved for submission to the Diocese.

It was anticipated that: -

- The weekly (in term time) Toddler Group would re-start in November.
- The Second Sunday 'All Age Service of the Word' would be re-introduced in September.
- A fortnightly Youth Group would be started in St John's Church at the beginning of October.
- St John's (3rd Farnworth) Brownies would re-start in St John's School in October.

SEPTEMBER



On Sunday 5th September, a presentation was made to, two of our longstanding members of the choir. Cynthia Dagnall and Sheila Glover who were stepping down after singing in the choir for 43 years.

OCTOBER

PROPOSALS FOR THE SHAPING OF THE DEANERY

The October meeting was attended by the Area Dean, Revd Simon Cook, who explained that it was about working together, not about adding extra work loads. It won't change how churches work. It is meant to help and look at what we can do together over the community.

BUILDING UPDATE

Leaking Roof in North Stairwell - Father Stephen reported that the leak had now been remedied. It had been caused by the gutters and downspouts being blocked with leaves.

Church Yard Wall damaged by poplar tree in neighbour's garden – Father Stephen advised that the wall would be re-built at a cost of £5,000 + £1,000 VAT Total Cost £6,000.

FIRST AID BOX

Following a report that the contents of the church first aid box were out of date, Denise Entwistle had very kindly bought a new First Aid Box and Accident Recording Book.

SCHOOL NEWS

School Assemblies - Father Stephen reported that School Assemblies were going well. St John's Whole School Assembly in Church on Thursday mornings had now been opened up to parents.

Experience Christmas – Kim McIntyre had organised 'Experience Christmas' for year 3 pupils (7/8 year olds) and 6 schools (over 200 children) were attending the event, which was due to take place from 23rd – 26th November.

MISSION ACTION PLAN

Father Stephen stated that the Mission Action Plan had been signed off pre-Covid.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

We continue to welcome and support newly arrived Asylum Seekers, one of whom has been baptised. We have also welcomed members of the Travelling Community and one of their community had been buried in the new churchyard

CHURCH MAGAZINE – The Church Magazine was re-launched in October.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

CHURCH YOUTH GROUP – Since completing the ALM Course in Children and Families Ministry, Steph Buckley had arranged a Youth Group Consultation Evening on Sunday 10th October 2021. At the meeting the views of the young people were to be sought as to what they wanted from a youth group.

TODDLER GROUP – It was reported that it was due to start on Monday 1st November 2021.

SECOND SUNDAY ALL AGE SERVICE – Sunday 11th September 2021 had seen the re-start of the All Age Family Service of the Word, when 120 people, including 40 children had attended.

ST JOHN'S (3rd FARNWORTH) BROWNIES – Had re-started on Tuesday 5th October 2021 and they will be attending Church Parade at the Second Sunday All Age Services.

SECOND SUNDAY CHILDREN'S SERVICE AT ST PETER'S SCHOOL – It was hoped to start a new monthly Children's Second Sunday Service at St Peter's School – possibly in January 2022.

NOVEMBER



Poppy Petals Dropping from the Church Gallery

On Sunday 14th November 2021, the annual Remembrance Sunday Service was held at St John's Church for the first time since Covid 19 restrictions. It was wonderful to be allowed to sing hymns again, especially the National Anthem and see our beautiful church full of worshipers.

We were able to resume the St John's tradition of dropping poppy petals from the church gallery during the 2 minute silence.

DECEMBER

MISSION ACTION PLAN

Parish Re-organisation - At the December meeting Father Stephen informed members that we had picked up 3 more churches. A joint 'Mission Team Leader' was to be appointed and there would be joint Lent Services in March 2022. Tony Cowell was to be licensed for St Stephen's, Kearsley Moor, in March 2022. The plan would be updated following the joint Mission Team Leader appointment.

CAROL SERVICE.





Sunday 19th December saw the return of our annual Christmas Carol Service. This was attended by 55 adults and 24 children.

CHRISTINGLE

Although we had to cancel our Christingle Workshop and were unable to make Christingles due to Covid rules, we substituted 'Glow-Sticks' and our 6.00pm Christingle Service on Christmas Eve was well attended.

Treasurer's Report

I want to start on a personal note; the role of treasurer has become increasingly more difficult mainly due to trying to change the mandate signatories which has been going on since 2019. I have spent over 50 minutes on the phone to Barclays.....TWICE! I don't have the time or patience for this.

We have actually made a profit of just over £22,500 in 2021 instead of a loss which is great news however with the current climate of price increases we will see what 2022 brings.

Our regular giving was down by just under £1000 but our loose money on the collection plate was up which made our total giving roughly the same as 2020. We had a good year for donations which has helped the church finances tremendously. Funerals were slightly up on last year but due to the pandemic we didn't take any monies for weddings, hopefully this will rectify in 2022.

On Expenditure we are down on 2020 by over £6,500 on church maintenance and our amenities combined cost has risen by over £3,500 on the previous year and will be set to rise when the new price hikes hit us all in September.

To close, I am hoping to pass over the role of Treasurer to Pat who I will assist where needed and hopefully shall bring more organisation to the role than I previously have.

Planned Giving and Gift Aid Report

In 2021 there were 40 contributors (giving either via an envelope or through a bank standing order) up from 39 in 2020.

31 members had signed up to the Gift Aid Scheme, and the amount of tax reclaimed on their donations, with the addition of those who had signed One-Off Donation envelopes, amounted to £6,078 in 2021 which is an increase of 9% on 2020.

Due to HMRC's Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme (or GASDS for short) which was introduced in April 2013, we are now able to claim 'top-up' payments on amounts of up to £8,000 on none Gift Aided cash donations of £30 or less. The income from this amounted to £790.83 in 2021 compared with £1,258.55 in 2020. This amounts to a decrease of 37% for the year which is entirely due to the church being closed for much of 2020 because of Covid restrictions. Income received in 2021 is for the tax year 6/4/2020 to 5/4/2021 while income received in 2020 was for the tax year 6/4/2019 to 5/4/2020.

Thank you to all who contribute through Planned Giving and the Gift Aid Scheme.

In terms of the fabric of the Church, the only notable event was a leaking roof on the north west corner of the church. This was due to blocked drainage on the roof

The APCM was once again held in Church, and attendance was much improved over the previous year's ZOOM meeting.


"Live generously and graciously toward others, the way God lives toward you." Matthew 5:48



(January 2021 - December 2021)



This year's report follows what can only be described as one another of the most challenging times our children and families have ever faced. The school continued to work tirelessly with its local church and community to press forward with raising standards despite the global pandemic. I feel exceptionally proud of all the children of St John's have achieved over the last year and look forward to the future now that we are able to get back to normal and 'Living with Covid'

Spring term 2021

Unfortunately just as the Spring term started and we were looking forward to getting back to normal at St John's the second lockdown was announced. The school opened its doors to every year group across school and tried to get as many families back into school to support the community during such challenging times.

For the families who didn't want to risk bringing their children into school the school did its best to provide suitable learning opportunities via it Remote Learning Policy and TEAMS to all children at home during this time and ensured appropriate support for families at the point of need through our Pastoral Officer and Behaviour and Engagement Mentor making welfare calls to families and sign posting them to agencies and charities throughout the second wave of the pandemic.

Manchester Diocese supported all schools by providing spiritual guidance with weekly remote worship and this was invaluable at St John's in support our children Christian journey whilst they couldn't be with us in person – as well as providing mental well-being for children and families at home.

Upon our return in March our Reception were able to hold three 'Wiggle Worship' sessions led by Steph from Changing Places Team – this event was held separately for each bubble and unfortunately could not include parents this time.

However Experience Easter at St John's Church had to be cancelled due to COVID restrictions.


School managed to ensure we held an Infant and Junior Easter Service at St John's as normal with all classes taking part and retelling a portion of the Easter Story. This was recorded and uploaded to

Twitter and the school's FB account for parents to share in. School continued to hold its annual Easter Egg Decorating competition - albeit is as colouring competition across the school with prizes awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place per class. The Junior Unit also held a hard-boiled Egg decorating competition where children could submit their creations via TEAMS and prizes were also given out for this too.



Summer term 2021

Thankfully St John's opened its doors to all children again for the Summer term and it was so wonderful to have all of our children back with us again.



St John's just wasn't the same without the children and for many it was their ultimate faith that God had a plan for us all that got us through such a mentally and emotionally challenging time for all concerned.

During the summer term school were still unable to return to their normal weekly worship in St John's Church however as restrictions were lifted in July we managed to hold the Y6 Leavers' Service on Thursday 22nd July which was well attended by families and the children received a copy of the Bible as a gift from the PTA and a 'Moving On' book from St John's PCC to take with them to their secondary school.

The Changing Places Team offered a series of Y6 Transition sessions which were really well received and called 'The Emoji Project' – it consisted of three workshops to build self-esteem, encourage positive wellbeing and promote good mental health. Children discovered they can be HOPEFUL, BRAVE and KIND and create their own emoji survival kit. Linking to Bible stories and verses that will inspire everyone as they continue their spiritual journey at secondary school.



The Infant classes had a visit from the Wiggle Worship Team looking at following on from the Easter story, how Jesus appeared to his friends after he rose again. Unfortunately due to the timings of this we were unable to involve the parents as we would have wanted to.

Autumn term 2021

During the Autumn term school was initially able to return to their normal weekly worship both in school and at St John's Church however restrictions were put back in place by Bolton Local Authority from 18th October due to a rise in local cases. As such worship resumed on line within school and Father Stephen suggested coming into school on the Thursday morning to deliver worship to one year group at a time.

So in the Autumn term Y6 and Y5 had a visit from Father Stephen, this continued throughout the Spring term too – with all classes looking forward to their weekly visit form Father Stephen.





2021 was once again a year filled with challenge, due to the ongoing pandemic, yet also presented an opportunity for our community to pull together, support each other and work with purposeful effort, driving forward our school intent statement.

What is our vision?

As teachers we are often charged with the task of preparing our children for their future. At St. Peter's we think a little differently, and rather than prepare our children for a future that is imposed upon them, we aim to give them the skills necessary to create the future that they perceive for themselves. Today is the tomorrow of yesterday. By controlling today, we are creating the future of tomorrow. Our vision is to develop our children to enable them to create the future they aspire for themselves.

"Our children will contribute to and prosper in society."

How will our vision be achieved?

We believe our vision will be achieved if we provide our children with an environment, underpinned by British and Christian values, in which they can "Learn, Sparkle & Shine..."

Learn = develop wisdom, knowledge and skills.

Sparkle = develop individual character; hope, aspiration and courageous advocacy.

Shine = develop community spirit and learn to live well together.

- We believe inherited traits are only one part of the story of where we may end up. The environment created in our classrooms, the culture of hard work and determination that we encourage, the recognition that we are all able to increase our knowledge through learning, we believe, has an equally valid impact on our future success. (Learn)
- We believe that engaging in a rich and varied curriculum will provide our children with an opportunity to develop a positive attitude to learning and an environment in which they can flourish and thrive. (Sparkle)
- We believe that by using Christian Values to underpin our work, children will be able to spread positive attitudes and shine as a beacon in society. (Shine)

Our daily work is dedicated to achieving these aims.

January 2021-July 2021

January 2021 started with the Government announcement that our country would once again enter a national lockdown, and after having returned to school for one day following the Christmas period, we were told to move to remote learning and open school for children of key workers and vulnerable pupils only. Overnight we swiftly implemented our <u>remote learning policy</u> and successfully moved to online education.

The school continued to welcome between 70-100 pupils each day for face to face education and the staff adapted to a hybrid way of working, with all staff (except SLT who worked on site throughout) participating in a rota of on site and off site work.

Upon reopening in March there were many further challenges, with the implementation of 'bubbles', isolation of close contacts a, resulting in bubble closures, often repeatedly, and the arrival of the delta variant, with Bolton being at the forefront of this new wave. Despite this we remained steadfast on our mission to ensure our children were enabled to



Each week Mrs Williams recorded a whole school worship, which also was published on the school You Tube Channel and was watched across the school at the same time, along with the community and any pupils who were isolating and undertaking remote education.

During summer term we focussed on two themes, each aimed at giving a positive message on how to live life in all its fullness with God's help and guidance, providing our children with a memorable focus to guide their daily life.



The term ended with more of our annual traditions and services moving on line, which although not the same as face to face events, continue to allow our children to have their achievements recognised and our year 6 leavers to have their time at St. Peter's commemorated and celebrated.



September 2021 – December 2021 The new academic year started with a somewhat unexpected visit from Ofsted in the second week of term, and although we were not anticipating their arrival, we are delighted to say that they caught us 'as we are' and proud to report that they judged the school to continue to be outstanding.

Outcome

St Peter's CofE Primary School continues to be an outstanding school.

What is it like to attend this school?

Pupils at St Peter's flourish. This is because leaders and staff have high expectations of children and pupils and provide them with the very best education that they can. Classrooms are buzzing with the thrill of learning and achieving. Pupils work, undistracted by others. Pupils' learning activities are memorable as well as fun. Pupils read with passion and skill. They love mathematics and use their understanding to count and solve problems. As one pupil said to the inspector: 'Teachers teach us really well. If you get something wrong, they don't shout. They go over the work and help you.'

Pupils are happy. They are proud of their artwork, which is of a high standard and attractively displayed around the school. Pupils learn interesting, new words often and use them when speaking or writing. Statements of encouragement, such as from the Bible, are displayed prominently to prompt pupils and adults to think about their own views and beliefs

Pupils feel safe at the school because leaders and staff listen carefully to their views and act quickly to resolve any problems. Pupils' behaviour around the school is exemplary. Pupils said that on the rare occasions that bullying arises, leaders and staff help to resolve matters quickly.

Following the visit from OFSTED the school feels to be in a strong position to move forward with ambition and determination to provide the best possible opportunities for our pupils to 'flourish' and fulfil our school vision, aims and intent.

Throughout the autumn term COVID continued to have an impact on the way the school functioned. Bubbles remained in place and in order to minimise transmission of the virus, gatherings remained limited, meaning that our harvest and remembrance services were not open to parents, but were once again recorded and placed on the school You Tube Channel.

Our theme for the Autumn term focussed on the idea that with God's help, alongside our own hard work and determination we can achieve all things. The children quickly adopted this new theme and could be heard reciting it daily as they bumped in to different adults around school.



A big focus for the school this year is to develop our pupil voice and promote the courageous advocacy of our pupil leadership groups. Our shine team have been working with Alison Adlum from the Children Changing Places Project every Tuesday lunch time and have written a new school prayer, which is now incorporated in to our weekly worship, with each cohort learning a separate line.



Our <u>school council</u> has also been working hard to develop collaborative projects, and raising awareness of and money for local charities. Prior to Christmas they organised a toy donation, event, resulting in over 600 'good as new' toys being donated to Maddi's Butterfiles, a charity which works to support children with cancer, a charity very close to the heart of one of pupils.



Our Christmas events, continued to be 'virtual' but again were made available to our community through our school You Tube Channel. The links can be found below.



Farnworth continues to be a wonderful community to be a part of. The continuation of the Farnworth Matters project, brining all primary schools across Farnworth together, to work collectively for the greater good of the community is an inspiration for all. It is a pleasure to serve a community with such supportive parents and Governors and such wonderful children. As we move in 2022 and our schools once again open to the wider community we look forward to developing more opportunities for collaboration across the parish and beyond. With God's help we trust this community can continue to build and develop, so that our children will benefit from a vibrant and aspirant community ethos.

St John's F³ (F cubed) Youth Group

Our final session of the year was a Christmas party with games, bingo, pizza and treats.
